

A WEEK IN CALAIS

Back in August, I spent five days volunteering with L'Auberge / Help Refugees, an organisation which provides aid to the refugee camp known informally as the Calais Jungle. Given the magnitude of the refugee crisis over the past couple of years and the frequency with which I travel to France, I felt that this was a cause I was being called towards.

I was staying at a local hostel where a lot of the other volunteers stayed, which meant that when you came down to breakfast each morning you were guaranteed to find someone who could offer you a lift to and from the vast warehouse, situated about two miles from the camp, where most of the volunteer activities took place. A typical day would begin shortly after 9 o' clock with the entire group congregating for the morning briefing.

After engaging us in a short exercise routine to get us warmed up for the day ahead, one of the supervisors would give the usual welcome talk for the benefit of those who had just joined. Firstly they asked us not to divulge the warehouse's location as they'd had several unwanted visits from "fascists" who didn't agree with their objectives. They would also emphasise that most of us wouldn't get the chance to go inside the camp due to the amount of behind-the-scenes input required in order for those on the front line to do their bit and that those who did, should only do so for legitimate purposes and adhere to a strict code of conduct. As they put it, it isn't a tourist attraction, but rather the site of a humanitarian crisis and the reason we were there was "to clean up the mess that our governments should be cleaning up". When it came to allocating the daily responsibilities, they would always start by asking if there were any carpenters or mechanics present - which was always followed by deathly silence. It seemed as though they'd been in need of these particular skills for some time and to this day I wonder whether this request was ever answered! They would then proceed to list all the other different jobs that needed doing that day.

Admittedly the warehouse didn't offer much in terms of creature comforts but given that this was a grassroots cause, this was something we were all prepared to accept. There would usually be around one hundred or so volunteers on site during a typical day, carrying out a multitude of different tasks. One day I could be sorting piles of donated clothing or bedding, whilst on another I could be on a production line, packing up bags of foodstuffs to be distributed in the camp, or in the kitchen doing vegetable prep or even washing up the vast skillets that were used to prepare hot meals for around 2,000 residents of the camp. You'd find people in the yard chopping firewood or out the front loading one of the transit vans with supplies to be taken to the camp by one of the distribution teams. Every so often a vehicle would drive through the gates of the warehouse in order to drop off donations and several people would emerge to help unload them. The whole place was a beehive of activity!

During my time in Calais, I met people of different generations and from different cultural backgrounds and occupations, all of whom were united in a common cause and it was encouraging to witness so many people committed to helping those in need and carrying out the work that Jesus asked of us.

As I write this article, the camp is just a couple of days away from its planned closure by the French authorities, which will see many of its 9,000 residents sent to reception centres across France. It remains to be seen what will become of L'Auberge / Help Refugees in the aftermath of these events, although given their additional involvement with the camp at Dunkerque, I have no doubt that they will still continue to serve a valuable function for the foreseeable future.

NEWS OF MILAN RAI

Milan Rai was a political refugee from Bhutan (next to Nepal), escaping to England after his father disappeared. He was with us at Holy Trinity for about two years, leaving Aldershot about four years ago, after an attempt to set up a restaurant in Camberley failed, and on top of that Rama was robbed and lost all her savings.

Milan and Rama worked in an Indian restaurant in Barnstaple in Devon. After a year they set up their own restaurant and takeaway, the Everest Gurkha Chef, (3 Maiden St, Barnstaple EX31 1HA 01271 376863), which has become well established and popular with the locals. They have a hard working day, preparing food through the day, and opening in the evening, but love the independence of being their own bosses, or, as Milan says, Rama enjoys bossing him about and telling him when he does things wrong. They still worship at Holy Trinity in spirit.

As two of maybe 12 or so local people from Asia, they are well received. Milan sends greetings to all who know them, and remembers fondly his time with HTA.



If ever anyone who knows them was in, or passing through, Barnstaple, they would be very welcome, and you would not regret it. The food is as near to perfect as it is possible to get. We visited them on the way back from a holiday in Cornwall, and were treated like royalty.

ASSOCIATED NEWS

I don't know what you think of the news at the moment, but most of it is unrelentingly depressing. There is the presidential election in the USA, where the behaviour of both candidates, but especially Donald Trump, is enough to make one shake one's head in disbelief that people can even entertain for a minute the thought that someone like him has the character to be the leader of a country of the importance to the world of the USA. There is the confusion and uncertainty around Brexit and the impact that this will have on the composition of the United Kingdom, as well as the distraction to the government of running the country while trying to negotiate the exit from the EU. There is the continued fighting in the Middle East, in Syria and in Iraq, with the push to retake Mosul from IS.

All of this raises the question of where is our security – democracy, the economy, the NHS? In a sense we perhaps all know that the answer is that our security should be in God, rather than in anything else, but does that really play out, and how does it play if things 'go wrong' or not as we planned?

As some of you will remember, I committed to reading the Bible in a year, and am currently reading Acts (I didn't start at the beginning and just work my way through... and I'm on target to finish by the end of the year). And it is fascinating to see the interplay between the Spirit, the Holy Spirit and the disciples, especially Paul. Sometimes the Spirit tells them what to do, sometimes Paul (or the other disciples) just decide to do something and things happen as a result.

So for example in Acts 19 v21 when Paul is in Ephesus, it says that Paul decided to leave Ephesus, and return to Jerusalem, via Greece (a slightly circuitous route, but one that would take in the churches he had planted earlier). And then, Luke says, he decided that he wanted to go on to Rome. When it says Paul decided, the Greek is ambiguous, as it says, he purposed in his spirit, and because the original Greek had no capitals, it is not clear whether this means the Holy Spirit, or Paul's 'spirit'. Perhaps it's not so important, as it is clear that Paul had a clear determination that this was what he was going to do, that this was his calling from the Father.

And through the account in Acts of Paul's journey to Jerusalem there are a number of references to the Spirit (definitely the Holy Spirit) making it clear that trouble awaits Paul in Jerusalem. So in Acts 20, v23, when Paul is saying a final and definitive goodbye to the church in Ephesus, he talks about the Spirit witnessing to him that troubles and imprisonment await him. In Acts 21, in v4 and then in v11, there are two instances of people speaking as a result of insight from the Holy Spirit saying in v4 – Don't go to Jerusalem, and in v11 a prophecy that he would be tied and imprisoned if he went to Jerusalem. So naturally Paul's companions plead with him not to go. And Paul ignores them and goes onto Jerusalem. What is happening? Is Paul being disobedient?

Pauls' response – in the Message – shows his different perspective. He says (v13) 'Why all the hysteria? ... You're looking at this backwards. The issue in Jerusalem is not what they do to me, whether arrest or murder, but what the Master Jesus does through my obedience. Can't you see that?'

And there is a parallel of Jesus setting his face to Jerusalem, knowing that going there will lead to arrest and death. Two cases of individuals where, in their perspective, the most secure place to be is in the centre of the Father's will for them, even if that will leads to a loss of what we would normally deem to be security and safety.

Perhaps that puts the potential lack of security caused by the US Presidential election, Brexit and wars in the Middle East into perspective. But it's quite a challenge, especially when we remember that a disciple is not above his master, that Jesus talked about how his Father prunes those branches that are fruitful.

We say that no-one wishes suffering, hardship, lack on to himself (or herself). We all want comfort and security – and indeed both Paul and Jesus promise that that is what the Father provides. It's perhaps just that his definition of comfort and security may not always overlap with ours. What's important is our obedience, and remaining in his will. Because the issue is not what happens to us in any given situation, it's what the Lord is able to do through our obedience.

GEORGE WRITES

Dear Friends,

Thinking back to our wonderful Harvest Supper/International Community Food Fair - what a taste of heaven that was at so many levels. I'm not just talking about the wonderfully prepared food from four different continents and 14 different nations (France, England, Serbia, Bulgaria, Poland, USA, Caribbean, Nepal, India, Korea, Ghana, Kenya, Nigeria, and Swaziland). But praying for those nations and worshipping together, along with all the children joining in, was such a special time. Even having grace said in almost 10 different languages was somehow special. Thank you to Sue Chadwick, Jonathan and others who did much of the preparation and thank you to all those who came to be part of it and, especially, those who brought the delicious food! There were about 100 of us and I reckon it was the best Harvest Supper ever.

As part of the evening a number of people filled in some bits of paper with prayers for their own nations. These are now on the board at the back of church so do pray for the different nations and concerns.

On a different note, if anyone would like to be part of a small group of people willing to get a few prayer request e-mails from me relating to my role in London, please do let me know. I do value your prayers in this whole area.

Sunday 13th November will be our Remembrance Sunday so, as usual, we will have a short **Act of Remembrance** between the two services from 10.55-11.05. Do remember to come early or stay a bit later!



Now I want to share something that I find quite significant. Soon after I arrived at Holy Trinity I called a PCC and leaders' day away, which happened in September 1999 (a long time ago!) It was to seek some vision for the way ahead. I asked people how they viewed the church as it was then – in fact I asked them to draw that pictorially – and then I asked them to share and write down their dreams and visions for what the church would be like five years from then (after a good time of prayer). At the end of the day I put all those things into an envelope and sealed it and said that I would open it again five years later to see how those dreams might have been being fulfilled. Five years later I did remember, but I could not find that envelope anywhere!

A couple of weeks ago, when I was clearing out clutter in our garage, guess what I discovered! It was very significant. People's drawings of how they saw the church over 17 years ago were quite telling: there seemed to be a lot of 'keep out' signs, there was coldness, there were pictures of adults shushing children, there was a sense of it being dark and uncomfortable, as well as very unwelcoming and almost invisible to the community as well as completely off their radar. So, let me ask you, is that how are you find Holy Trinity now?

The dreams are even more telling. There was a lot about growth, about young adults joining the church, about the building becoming more comfortable, flexible, warm, welcoming and friendly, there was the desire to see newer forms of worship and more members of staff. A lot was also centred on making a real difference to the town by reaching out in lots of different ways. There was clearly a desire to see a church of all ages and all types of people. As I looked out at our harvest supper and over some of our services I saw something of the fulfilment of that longing and of those dreams.

I quote my piece of paper, which I pulled out of the envelope (recognised by its being the worst hand writing):

'My dream for Holy Trinity:

- of a place, vibrant with love and compassion, where the hurting and confused can find acceptance, love, forgiveness and purpose
- of a place motivated by God's love for the lost
- of sharing the good news with 5000 people in Aldershot and beyond.
- of a growing church family, learning, loving, laughing and living in unity.
- of developing each member to spiritual maturity through many means.
- of equipping every believer to be a unique minister serving God with the gifts He gives
- of a place of quality worship, where fear is dispelled and where the presence of God is felt powerfully, even by unbelievers.
- of seeing Aldershot changed because of the power of Jesus.'

Well, I think some of that dream, along with much of what others said, is at least partly reality. There is some way to go, but I do feel encouraged that I found that envelope and, if you want to see all the contents (maybe you were on that day away), please do ask me.

Be thoroughly blessed. Work towards being part of fulfilling those dreams. Be a blessing.

CHIEF'S CONCERNS

Something I stumbled on recently, written by a very well known Church of England minister, who had been in ministry for some years when this happened - I wonder if it will capture your attention like it did mine.

“That’s it! That’s it! I’m a son of God!”

It was like a great flash of light. Something I had been searching for had suddenly been discovered. “I am a son of God!” That truth transformed my life and my ministry; I had discovered the **normal** Christian life.

God is wanting to do so much for His people; but I had never dared to believe that He wanted to do very much for me. I had been taught to be highly suspicious of “experience” and “subjective Christianity”. God was often portrayed to be great, but remote; to be believed in, to be worshipped, but definitely not to be experienced in a personal way. What mattered above everything else was objective truth; that we believed in God’s existence and His love.

Now something was happening to me; something that could only be described as “experience”. I felt different. I **was** different. I was bubbling over with joy. It seemed as if the whole room, the whole house, everyone and everything around me had changed. I wanted to go dancing and skipping around the house shouting, I’m a son of God! I’m a son of God! I AM A SON OF GOD!”

Now I was set free to enjoy Jesus. My old life was dead; I need not live in subjection to the sin, the fears and doubts of the past. I was a new person, free to share a new, risen life with Jesus. I was a son of God, filled with the Holy Spirit. I knew it not only in my head; my whole being witnessed to the fact.

I was filled with praise for God, in a way I had never known before. Words could not express the love I felt for Jesus.

Jesus was real in a more intimate way than ever before. Prayer was a sheer delight, for I was in communion with God in a deeper way. The Bible, which had become more precious to me over the years, leapt to life, the Lord was speaking to me from every page. I was feeling happy and free and full of love for those who were around me. A new kind of love - it is so difficult to put into words how liberated I felt. I was free to love God’s people and I was free to love Him as never before. “

Do you want to experience this Jesus? Be encouraged and read on and see what He has to say to you today!

Turn to me and you will be filled with joy and your healing will be assured, for I am the Lord who cares for you and you are my people whom I shall always love.

So come to me and share in the inheritance that is yours – healing and wholeness. This is my gift for those who repent, that they will know that they can turn to me in their sickness and they will be healed.

But those who have not turned to me with their whole heart, they do not know; they do not claim the assurance I offer them. There is only one way to receive my gifts – come to me in sorrow for what you have become and I will make you glad in what you shall be. I will pour my gifts into your heart and make you mine forever.

Rejoice my people, for the day of your deliverance has come. Turn and be healed, for I would fill you with myself. My people, I love you. Will you spurn my love? Will you turn away from I who am your health, turn to me and be restored. Be made whole and you will live to my glory and be happy.

IRAN: PASTOR BEHNAMEH IRANI RELEASED AFTER SIX YEARS IN PRISON

Earlier this year at Holy Trinity we prayed during the morning services and at the Monday night Prayer Praise and Prophecy for a number of Christians by name held in prison, suffering persecution because of their faith. Well, give thanks for some good news about one of the people we prayed for!

18 October 2016

Friends of Pastor Behnameh Irani are pleased to announce that he has finally been released after six years in prison in Iran.

Behnameh Irani was given a five-year suspended sentence in 2008, after he was charged with 'action against national security' (he had become a Christian in 1992, before becoming a pastor of the self-styled 'Church of Iran' in 2002).

But in 2010, Behnameh was re-arrested during a house church service. In May 2011, he was summoned to serve a one-year prison sentence for new charges of action against national security - to which a suspended five-year sentence was later added.

Poor health and additional sentences

Whilst Behnameh was detained in Ghezel Hesar Prison in Karaj, he suffered serious health issues - many related to physical abuse he received at the hands of fellow prisoners. On 22 February 2014, he was taken to hospital for an operation to staunch bleeding from the stomach and colon.

Later that year, in September 2014, he was charged with 'Mofsed-e-filarz' http://www.opendoorsuk.org/news/stories/iran_140910.php - a capital crime translated as 'spreading corruption on Earth'. The Mofsed-e-filarz charge was dropped later that month and replaced by charges of 'action against national security' and 'creating a network to overthrow the system', and he was put in solitary confinement.

Additional charges dropped

On 19 October 2014, Behnameh was sentenced to a further six years in prison and exile to Zabol on the Afghanistan border. But less than two months later, the additional charges and sentence were dropped following an appeal.

Finally, in August 2016 Behnameh was informed that he was due for release in October. Middle East Concern report that he was released from prison yesterday evening (17 October).

Thank you for your prayers

Thank you to all of our supporters who have been praying for Behnameh and have written to encourage him over the past few years. Your prayers and actions have been making a real difference!

In November 2014, Behnameh wrote a message to his friends to encourage them <http://www.opendoorsuk.org/news/stories/iran_141125.php>, saying:

"Many of my cellmates in prison ask me why I am paying such a huge price for my belief in Jesus Christ. They ask me why I don't just deny my belief and go back to my wife and children? I then ask myself: what cost did the Lord pay to save me, and to transfer me from the kingdom of darkness to the kingdom of light? The death of Jesus Christ on the cross, the blood of the Lamb of God! Yes this is a huge price. Therefore I am also able to prefer prison over being set free. I have decided to keep my faith in our Lord and stay in prison.
