One thing that God has been teaching us since we arrived in Las Palmas is that the Canary Islands have a bad reputation for young people going on holiday and getting drunk and other sorts of activities, but never had I really thought 'what is the church like on these islands' or even thought that there could be Christians living here, which made me sad. On Saturday night there was a bunch of us from the ship and we went out to the streets to try and be an example and to be God's light here and it was really interesting to see lots of tourists here from Europe, using these islands for their pleasure. Do be praying for us in these islands, that we can have an effect on the people here in a positive way.

Also be praying, as I felt before this would happen, that a lot of people are taking breaks and a lot of family members are coming, including my Grandparents. As they don't believe in our Lord, please pray that that their visit will be impacted when they see the ship and the community here on board. Also please be praying for our 12 day sail across the ocean, that it would be a pleasant crossing.

ALDERSHOT CHURCHES PRAYING TOGETHER

THE LARDER - CAN WE PICK IT UP?

Jane has been running the larder on behalf of the church since 2008. Now she is starting a course of study and is having to stop at the end of the year. We are very grateful to her for this. About 500 parcels of food have been delivered.

The larder provides an emergency (only) service to people in Aldershot, who have run out of money, and have nothing to eat. It can happen for all sorts of reasons - out of work, pay or benefits are late, large unexpected bill, like a washing machine car breaking down.



People get referred by the Citizens Advice Bureau. There are typically between one and five referrals a week. There's a mobile phone for this (a bit like the Batphone), and the holder would answer and decide if we are going to deliver. I'm happy to do this, but need somebody to cover for holidays or if I'm travelling.

Church members leave food in a box at the back of church, and Park Church adds some. This food needs to be sorted into types, dates checked, put into packages for delivery. Also write on the board at the back of church what foods are needed. That is one job, which could be done before or after church. Is this you, or is it something you could take on with a friend?

When the CAB phones up, ideally the same day, we need to deliver a package. That's another job - could you be on call to deliver on one day of the week, add some bread and milk on the way? You could keep a package in your car or at home, or it could be picked up from my house to save braving the church keys. Is this you? Could you take on one day, where you would be free in the afternoon most weeks?

It is not a big operation, but putting myself in the shoes of somebody who has nothing in the fridge today, nothing to give to my children, I would be very grateful for it, and not too far away from the centre of Jesus' message, showing compassion and help to those who cannot repay.

How it is done in detail could be changed to be better as we go, but the question is if we can keep it going? If it's something that you think you could give some time to, contact me 07747 603 834. We need to decide quickly if there are enough people to make it viable, as Jane wants to give notice to the CAB by 15th December if the Larder is going to stop.

ASSOCIATED NEWS

Who do you pray to, when you pray? Is it God the Father, Jesus Christ or the Spirit? Now there's no right or wrong answer to that question, and most of us will, for a variety of reasons, tend to pray to one of the persons of the Trinity (the Father, Son or the Spirit) more than the other two. I was asked this question recently, and for me the answer is that predominantly I pray to the

Father. And what the person I was talking with said, is that we need to learn to pray to each of the Father, Jesus and the Spirit equally. It's learning to pray to the Trinity. And learning to pray to the Trinity helps us grow in our knowledge of the Trinity – and what greater treasure than that could there be?



In my Bible reading – through the Bible in one year, I'm now reading Proverbs – pithy little sayings covering lots of different areas of life, which present principles about life, and how the spiritual dimension of life (that we can't see) is as real as the material and physical dimension that we can see. And the constant message of the Proverbs is that knowledge of God is better than riches or anything else.

For me prayer is as much being with and getting to know another person – the Father, or the Son or the Spirit, and in so doing getting to know myself, as it is about actually bringing a list of requests. Obviously there are requests, but prayer is about being aware of the presence of this other person. In case you think that this is something that comes easily it doesn't – there are times when my mind is distracted by all sorts of things – I have to learn to put these down, perhaps to make a note of them, so that I can come back to them, but then to get back to focusing on the person I am trying to be in relationship with. It can therefore take time before there is any sense of the presence of God.

There are two things that are important – firstly there's time, and then there's desire. But it starts with time – we can resolve to dedicate a certain time; and if you don't feel that the desire is there, then ask for that desire. Time is one area where the rule about 'the more you put in, the more you get out' works. Our Father knows that there are things we need to do in the day, but we fool ourselves if we think that 5 minutes squeezed in somewhere will be enough. As much as anything, you will find it takes more than 5 minutes to clear your mind of distractions. Anything less than 20 minutes will quickly prove disappointing and unrewarding.

It can be helpful to start with a passage from the Bible to help you focus on God – and your choice of passage could help you focus on one particular person. So if you wanted to focus on the Spirit, you could read something from John 16, where Jesus talks about the Comforter, the Spirit and how he will work with us.

GEORGE WRITES

Dear Friends, Again, I do want to thank you for your support and prayers for my role in London. If ever you feel it will be helpful for folk to come and hear some of what it involves, I would very happily arrange a meeting sometime and share a lot of the exciting, unique and challenging experiences. In many ways it feels like a different world to the world of Aldershot. There are also times that it feels Narnia-esque, in that unique doors seem to open into all sorts of different worlds and it is, at times, an amazing privilege.

I found myself reflecting on 24 hours or so of one week in November. I had the privilege of being invited to a State Banquet at the Guildhall with about 700 other people, where the principal guest of honour was the President of Colombia. At one level it was an amazing occasion with incredible pageantry, with pike-men, trumpeters and rich ceremony. But the President was this year's Nobel Peace Prize winner, as he has nearly brought to an end 50 years of internal Civil War and struggles with guerrilla groups. Jane and I happened to spend three months in that country over 27 years ago, when there were so many troubles from drug cartels as well as guerrilla groups, but where we also saw the rise of people turning to follow Christ. It was so heartening to hear of his work and now the growing trade links with the UK and that many millions who had been living in extreme poverty are now housed and working. On such occasions, as well as it being such an amazing and eye opening event, one finds oneself talking to some very influential and interesting people. On one side I happened to be next to a Colombian professor, and there were judges, aldermen and others nearby.

That was a late night and the following morning, after a couple of hours of administration up there, I had the privilege of being invited by one of the two Sheriff Aldermen of the City to join him at the Old Bailey (the centre of the criminal justice system in the UK). There were three other guests, all of whom seemed influential and important compared to me (including the President of MCC!). We lunched with the judges and so I had one on my right and one on my left and one opposite — what absolutely amazing people, doing an incredible job. The interesting thing was that all three had a very clear Biblical faith, which influenced, fed and directed them, which I found so encouraging. I was able to share with one, who had been bemoaning the fact that many in the judicial system are now suffering with mental health issues and there have even been some recent suicides, that we have found that through strategic, united prayer we have seen a real difference in our town. She was very interested and might look to start up a similar prayer group in the Old Bailey! PTL.

After the lunch I was invited to sit in on a rather high profile court case for an hour. Sitting in I could see why so many in the system were open to being affected by mental health issues from the trauma of what they have to hear and see as part of their work. I was in the fairly high profile case where the defendant was accused of four murders and eleven rapes, all of young and

vulnerable men. We were sitting in only on one of the rape cases and it was his ninth day in the dock. Yet the descriptions of what he had done were so incredibly graphic and therefore I found very disturbing. There had been a slight delay as there had been a "problem" with one of the members of the jury. I'm not surprised, as they also have had to watch some of the videos of these assaults. This opened my eyes to some of the horrors that are around us and I resolved to pray for those 12 jurors as well as those in the judicial system. A lot in this 24 hours was surreal, but it was equally so to think I might have been sitting ten yards from a mass murderer/rapist.

After that I was back to the Girdlers for a committee meeting about our charitable support and we welcomed the head of one particular charity we support there who worked amongst many of the disadvantaged to help those who are in prison short term to find real value in life and not to reoffend. But they are also now working with families and children at the primary school level to look at both intervention and prevention and it was so heartening to see his heart to make a difference.

The next night I was out on the streets of Aldershot with the Town Centre Pastoral Team, meeting many folk there who were both homeless and facing many deep life issues.

At one level all these things seemed like very different and disconnected worlds. However, on reflection, I found a real link. We are working to transform our town and nation; we all have a heart to see evil overcome and people coming to a place of healing, restoration, health and peace. Almost all those I heard or spoke to who were working for this, actually had a clear Christian faith and were looking to be salt and light in very dark places, whether in Colombia, London or Aldershot. In all, I found myself really quite moved and touched to the heart, but also really heartened with the bigger picture of what God is doing in the world and the nation and something of our part in it.

Once again, if you would like me to arrange a meeting for an hour to share about this and so many other experiences/opportunities, please let me know.

Christmas is fast approaching and details of all the Carol Services and other Christmas events, as well as the opportunities to reach out with angels around the town, are listed in this Update. This is a wonderful opportunity for us to make a difference in the lives of other people, as we invite folk to come and hear the genuine Christmas message and to find out more about Jesus.



Please do take many of the invitation cards that are in church and personally invite friends, neighbours, colleagues and family. And let's pray together for a really joyful and fruitful Christmas in town and at Holy Trinity.

CHIEF'S CONCERNS

So we are all about to enter the Christmas season; love it or hate it, here we are. This is a time when we all share a similar Frontline! This is a season of great opportunity to share Jesus with many, to invite and include people who as vet have not encountered His love at first hand, to invite to Christian celebrations and social gatherings.

There are two things we will need to be very intentional about during this Christmas season to see God's love impacting people's lives, prayer and evangelism or sharing Jesus.

First as we have said many times, prayer as a church is vital. "Prayer being an exercise of power and government in the spiritual atmosphere and creates tangible and measureable results on the earth. Come on, church, it is time to join in and pray"

There are two "must not miss" opportunities: at HT on Monday 5th Dec and at the Church of the Ascension on Monday 12th Dec.

Secondly some encouraging steps toward developing evangelism for this season, and in your life.

Listen to the argument that Richard Larcombe brings:

The most important things in life to us, we do on purpose. Take eating for example. Eating is necessary to life. Therefore we eat on purpose. We buy food, prepare a meal and then sit down and eat it. We don't eat accidentally. We eat intentionally. And some of us can eat more intentionally than others!

When it comes to evangelism, the goal is a lifestyle. I want to be "open for business" anytime, anywhere. But here's the reality: if I never plan evangelism into my busy schedule, then I find that I am almost never "open for business". Without an intentional commitment to personal evangelism. I can never hope to walk in a lifestyle of evangelism.

So what does this look like? For me it looks like a time-slot on my calendar. Come rain or shine, Friday night is my night to go love on people. It's become one of my favourite times in the week: Friday night outreach.

Because I engage in evangelism every week intentionally, I have found that I am much more open to minister to people at other times in the week as well.

Is this legalism? No. I don't do this because I have to. I do this because I love Jesus, and it is a joy to see Him transform lives. I require myself to engage in personal evangelism, because I know it is a vital part of my spiritual life.

The same is true of reading the Bible, prayer with believers, worship and coming in to church each week. I am not a slave to these things. I want to do them, because I am alive in Christ. As you are intentional in evangelism, it will quickly become a lifestyle that you can lead others into."

I know it's dark, wet, cold and we all feel like hiding away, but why not make Christmas 2016 a time to step out and join in and see God's love and power at work! Seek out the opportunities, there are plenty of ways coming up at HT and in Aldershot, why not be brave and join the TCPT Team on a Friday or Saturday evening close to Christmas for an hour, or help out daytime up at the Bandstand on the 17th December with Churches Together. Why not join with others so you don't have to go it alone. Let us encourage each other and build each other up. Whatever steps you take, be Intentional this Christmas season.


The Advent Challenge
