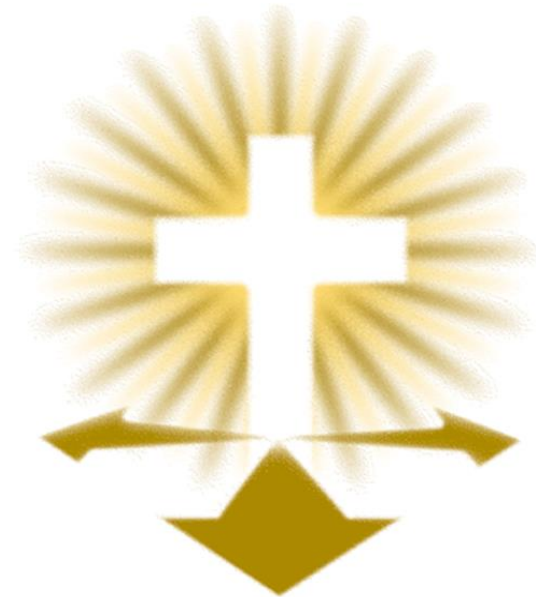

If you think of Holy Trinity as 'your' church, but are not already on the Roll, can I encourage you to sign up? Under Church of England rules you should:

- be aged at least 16
- be baptised (not necessarily in the Church of England)
- **either** live within the Holy Trinity parish **or** have worshipped here for at least 6 months.

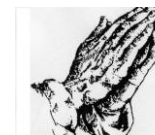

Our next meeting will be on January 28th between 10.00 am and noon and we look forward to meeting with anyone who suffers from any mental health issue or their carers.

ASSOCIATED NEWS

Well, I have read the Bible in one year. I finished off – quite appropriately – with Revelation, which despite its name, is not the easiest book to understand! However the overall message is clear enough – that the Lord Jesus is in control and has authority and that there will be a full and final judgement of everyone; and that the culmination of everything will be that God will dwell with humanity in a fuller way than at present, and that all the things that disfigure life at the moment will be gone for good. It's also a book full of recorded praise and worship of God, as John sees into heaven, and sees how the business of heaven is actually the worship of God, Father, Son and Spirit.

On the subject of the Bible and the past year, we've just finished the first run through of the Bible Course. I say 'first run through', as there have already been people asking if we will be running it again – and the short answer is yes – we just need to decide when. It may not be straight away, but it will be well publicised! It's been very encouraging to see how the people who have done the course have enjoyed it, and it's been a great reminder of how important the Bible is. [See Paul Kirkup's comments opposite.]

We tend to forget Jesus saying, as he resists temptation, that man does not live by bread alone, but by every word that comes from God. We / I need to keep coming back to what the Bible says about a situation, about who I am (a child of God), and then take that as being the truth of that situation, rather than saying – it doesn't work for me. We have to make reading the Bible and praying – being in communication with, maintaining our relationship with our Father – the most important part of our life. My experience – and that of Christians down the ages – has been that I have to choose to do this, and to build my day around this. If I just think, or hope, that it will happen by itself, it doesn't. It's all about habit, getting into the habit of reading the Bible and praying.

And we have to do this in groups. One of the main elements that people enjoyed about the Bible Course was the opportunity to discuss in groups. We miss out if we don't have the opportunity to discuss with other people. We miss out on all the benefits of being in a group - the support and encouragement that others can give, and that we can give to other people – if we try to do this on our own.

As we go into 2017 with our verse for the year from Romans, about being transformed through the renewing of our mind, the focus here is the importance of the group together helping each individual to grow in its thinking. And historically Christianity is about the people of God – indeed right back in the garden in Genesis 2, God said that it was not good for the man to be alone. While that is primarily about Adam and his need for Eve, the principle behind it is that we do not function well on our own.

Part of the reason for this is that often on our own we struggle to see how and where God is at work in our life. One of the things that I enjoy in what I do is being able to spend time talking with people, trying to help them to see where and how God is at work in their lives. Not everyone feels the need for that, but if that is something that you think you would like to do, especially as we go into a new year, then please don't hesitate to ask.

THE BIBLE COURSE - GET THE BIG PICTURE

I recently finished an eight week study course on the Bible, covering from Genesis to Revelation, hosted by John Kellagher. The course was held on Wednesday evenings at Holy Trinity, with each evening being devoted to a particular section of the Bible. Teaching was delivered by a mixture of short DVD lectures given by Rev. Andrew Ollerton, followed by short discussion sessions and daily readings. Over thirty people attended the course, being split into groups of 8 or 9 people, led by Jonathan, Simon, John, Cara, George on occasion and David Haley.

It was an informative course, giving everyone the tools and skills to help people read and understand it for themselves. The sessions were interactive, with sections of teaching followed by a study exercise. Between each session there were daily readings to prepare for the following week and to encourage the habit of reading the Bible.

The course had three main aims:

- Learn the Bible - to understand it
- Live it - apply the Bible to your life
- Love it - make the Bible your priority and passion

The course gave a big picture overview of the Bible, showing how all 66 books within it are linked together. For those looking into the Christian faith, or already a long way in, the course is highly recommended. It will benefit people at all stages of their spiritual journey and at just £4 for the course book it is a worthwhile investment

FROM LARDER TO FOOD BANK - LATEST DEVELOPMENTS

Since writing about the larder in the December Update, there have been some interesting developments. People from other local churches, our local councillor, Alex Crawford, Jackie Maw and others, had already started conversations in late November, and already, after one meeting and a visit to the Farnborough food bank, there is a plan in place that looks like it could see a food bank open in Aldershot in early 2017, which would take over from what Jane and helpers have been doing with The Larder (still emergency help only.)



St Christopher's in Farnborough have been running a food bank for some time, under the umbrella of the Trussell Trust, a Christian organisation, inspired by Matthew 25: 35- 36 **, who provide experience, training and expertise, and help to resource a network of 400 food banks across the country. They run efficiently and it's well thought out, with a minimum of admin burden, but keeps track of visits etc. (** Mt 25:35-36 "For I was hungry and you gave me ...")

St Christopher's volunteers run a warehouse near the Garrison Churches in Browning Barracks, which collects food from donation boxes in supermarkets (Tesco etc) and individual donations, like our own to The Larder. They sort, date, and store the food, ready for delivery, and inform what they are running out of on their web-site, so people can adjust their donations.

The warehouse supplies St Christopher's Church and would supply Aldershot on the same basis, with a van keeping a cupboard store supplied, something they are very happy to do.

Bishop Malcolm Cummins at the New Testament Church, our near neighbours in Christ, in Victoria Road, has offered space that is very suitable, near the centre of town, just needing sprucing up and adding some suitable storage.

Agencies like CAB refer people with an emergency need for food, giving them a voucher, which gives the addresses of the local food banks. The scheme St Christopher's run opens at lunchtime three times a week. A cup of tea and biscuit/cake (looked very nice!) is offered, offer to pray with the person, and take their details, understand why they are in trouble and if appropriate, point them to help, and give them a package of food, which would last three days. This could tie in with some of the things the church is looking at with CAP.

It would be up to the Aldershot food bank to determine its own opening times, and adapt to local need. So the volunteering requirement has changed to: 'Would you be available for a couple of hours at lunchtime on a weekday(s) to help people at Aldershot's food bank? There will be training etc. '

I'll keep in touch with what is happening and will write again.

This is the Good News – Christmas 2016

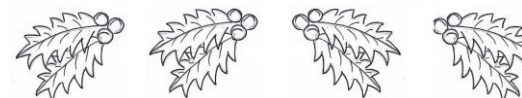

We had a lot of people through the doors who don't normally come to church, so please be praying for them, that seeds sown will grow into a harvest for eternal life and not be 'put away with the Christmas decorations'. I know that a lot of you very actively used the invitations and invited friends, colleagues and family in, so it was great to see many who responded to those invitations. Well done!

Because of the way that the New Year falls, we will have our PPP on Monday 9th January rather than on 2nd, which is a bank holiday. Maybe there are times you feel a little like the @ symbol 35 years ago – a bit marginalised and useless. Well, in God's economy, He may well take you out of obscurity and you might find yourself a key part of His plans. At the beginning of this year, put yourself into His hands and allow Him to make what He created into something special and usable to His glory.

So may God strengthen, guide and equip you for the year ahead as you fix your eyes on him and become more like Jesus.

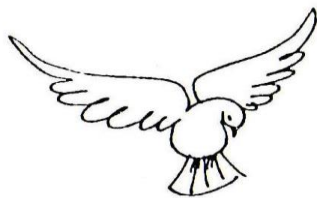
CHIEF'S CONCERNS

The greatest issue facing the world today, with all its heart-breaking needs, is whether those who, by profession or culture, are identified as 'Christians' will become disciples – students, apprentices, practitioners – of Jesus Christ, steadily learning from Him how to live the life of the Kingdom of the Heavens into every corner of human existence.

“When Jesus taught His disciples to pray, He gave them a list of principles to guide them. They are found in the Lord’s Prayer. It is a profound example of the kinds of things we’re to put both our attention and affection on in prayer. Perhaps the most important lesson learned is that the Kingdom of God becomes manifest through prayer.”

“Societal transformation is not an accidental by product of revival. It is to be the intentional focus of a people who are filled with hope. In revival, the Church becomes more convinced of a big God than a big devil. Such a shift in focus changes what’s possible. But it’s our internal world that is the first to change in the glory of His outpouring. For such a transformation to take place in the world around us, it must first happen to the world within us. Only what is true on the inside can be released to the outside. Jesus conquered a storm with peace. It was the storm He slept in. The peace that kept Him in rest was the peace that delivered Him from the storm itself. Internal realities become our external realities when we learn to release His presence. That is the nature of ministry: living from the inside out.”



“Without the outpouring of the Spirit, the Church becomes more concerned with being contaminated by evil than we are with “contaminating” the world with righteousness. While we should never take sin lightly, neither should we be ignorant of the power of holiness. Things are different in the New Testament in

that the whole covenant is given to meet the obvious need presented in the Old Testament. For example, the Gospel of Matthew was written primarily for the Jews. In this account of Jesus’ life, Jesus touching the leper was the first miracle that Matthew mentioned, as it seemed to help recalibrate the reader’s value system to be consistent with the value system of Jesus Himself.”

“When Jesus touched the leper, the leper became clean. Jesus did what was forbidden to do, bringing about what the law was unable to do. This testimony confronted an incomplete mindset that was not adequate for His present work of grace on the earth. This Kingdom mindset requires a shift in how we view and value life itself, and the effect of the life of Christ in us. Faith in Kingdom realities manifests Kingdom realities.”

“The power of holiness becomes clearer in the story of Daniel. God took Daniel and allowed him to be numbered with witches and warlocks before King Nebuchadnezzar. He lived righteously and brought about a New Testament effect of holiness and loyalty on an entire kingdom, until that ungodly leader was converted. Holiness is more powerful than sin; it’s the purity of Christ in you.”

Can we please be at prayer for the Vine Centre over the next few weeks. Below is an immediate update and some ongoing prayer targets from Mary Webb

Firstly, we give thanks for God’s hand on The Vine and in The Vine and for the positive Client outcomes, Night Shelter accreditation, recent award for our partnership award and our growth in the past two years in particular.

We really need prayers over the next couple of weeks, when a number of staff and volunteers are on holidays. There are some serious funding requirements needed too and a growing feeling up being "up against it"

- For more clients to come to know God and engage in ‘Faith Matters’
- To be able to develop the centre and successfully open the Mobile Catering Unit in January 2016
- To secure funding for the kitchen/catering staff and become self-sustaining in that area within 4 years.
- For volunteers, safety and peace throughout the Winter Night Shelter project
- To increase community, statutory and church giving, volunteering and in kind support.
- For grace and favour for our funding applications.

CAP Money is a simple, yet highly effective money management course that teaches people budgeting skills and a cash-based system that really works. This course will help anyone to get more in control of their finances, so they can save, give and prevent debt.

Holy Trinity Aldershot has partnered with Christians Against Poverty to offer the Money course within the church initially, but potentially in our community. The course and the service CAP offer is completely free.

PLEASE PRAY FOR COMPASSION

Compassion is a charity working with poor children in India. The following is a shortened version of two recent emails from Justin Dowds, CEO Compassion UK and Ireland, outlining the problems faced by the charity. Please pray for the situation.

Earlier in 2016, the Indian government placed restrictions on Compassion which meant we were unable to send funds to our local partners in India. The majority of our projects continue to operate to some degree in India, but most have very little money left and some have had to suspend certain activities. We've been working closely with the Indian government and have complied with all requests, including re-registration and government approval of all our local partners. However despite our best efforts, the situation has not improved.

Please pray urgently:

- For our local partners delivering the Compassion programme in India. That, despite having very few funds left, they are able to continue to deliver support and care for the children in their communities for as long as possible.
- For those in senior positions in the Indian government. That they will deliver a favourable outcome for Compassion which allows our work in India to continue.
- That the US government will respond positively to these submissions and will advocate strongly on behalf of the children in our programme.
- For the children living in poverty in India and that Compassion is allowed to serve them. We have about 130,000 children in our programmes in India.

We are not alone in facing this challenge. In the last two years, 11,319 other NGOs have lost their licenses. This decreases the number of foreign funded organisations in India to almost half the number it was just two years ago.

We are now at a critical stage with our India programmes, as this will determine the viability of continuing our work in India. Our hope and prayer is that we are able to continue to reach out to the poorest of the poor and enable children to gain access to food, education and all the tools they need to break free from the chains of poverty. But without the ongoing co-operation of the Indian government, this will not be possible.

Thank you for your incredible generosity and commitment to release children from poverty in Jesus' name. We are determined to leave no stone unturned in our resolution to continue ministering to children battling against the effects of extreme poverty.

SOME USEFUL THINGS AROUND THE CHURCH BUILDING

Pigeon holes: These are on a table at the back left (looking from the back) of the church ('blue corner'). These are alphabetical on surnames. Do check these periodically as rotas, cards, agendas, notes etc are often put there for people. On that table are also various bits of free literature, fliers, gospels etc.

The table at the back: this table, right by where we come in from Crossover, has notice sheets, the latest Update magazine along with the prayer calendar for the month as well as sign-up sheets, The Wey diocesan newspaper, petitions, large print hymn and song books etc.

Memorial display: in prayer corner is a display case with our memorial book. If you have loved ones who have died, we can place their names in this for memory and prayer.

CRISP UP YOUR PRAYER LIFE!

Praying with Stuff was the first of two mornings (the main events on prayer in Guildford Diocese, usually called the Day on Prayer). Revd Sally Dakin, Spirituality Adviser for the Winchester Diocese, led us through a whole range of ways to pray with the ordinary things of life; potatoes, playing cards and hose pipe to name a few. The nine prayer stations around St Paul's Church, Camberley were deceptively simple and gave wonderful ways of entering into prayer for our work - whatever form it takes. There is a **hearing loop** in the main church building and also in Crossover.
To tune into the loop use the "T" mode setting on your hearing aid.

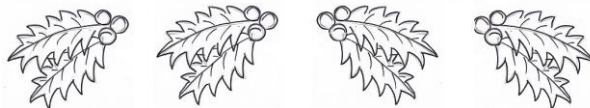
